Faith Comes by Hearing

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

Inspired by the Holy Spirit, St. Paul writes: "How then will they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in Him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching? And how are they to preach unless they are sent? As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who preach the good news!' But they have not all obeyed the gospel. For Isaiah says, 'Lord, who has believed what he has heard from us?' So faith comes by hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:14-17).

This section of Scripture is the mission statement for Concordia Seminary in St. Louis and Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne. In a way, this is also our mission statement. Prince of Peace Lutheran Church exists to be a disciple making community for the Lord Jesus Christ. But to make disciples, the Gospel must first be spoken and heard. To this we pray: "Blessed Lord, You have caused all Holy Scriptures to be written for our learning. Grant that we may so hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them that, by patience and comfort of Your holy Word, we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

Just as we inwardly digest fruit and vegetables, bread, and drink for our temporal life, we inwardly digest God's Word for our spiritual food. For without receiving God's Means of Grace, His Word and Sacrament, we would spiritually die. It is through His Means of Grace that our faith is strengthened through the work of the Holy Spirit. This is why we physically come to the Divine Service together each Sunday or Monday to receive forgiveness of sins and strength for our weak faith.

Some weeks ago, I began a podcast to which I call it a "POPcast." Now, listening to the podcast is not to

be understood as an alternative or substitute to the Divine Service, but it does serve a purpose. Again, "faith comes by hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17). You may want to hear the sermon again. Or this may be a way to evangelize the unchurched to consider coming to church. The podcast is called "Sounding the Scriptures POPcast" and it is available on Spotify. It can also be accessed on our church website. In the typical fashion of a podcast, it must have some radio elements. So, there is a theme song, a sound clip from "Built on the Rock" to which the podcast is named. Each POPcast includes the sermon and its Scripture text, as well as a sound clip from the Hymn of the Day.

As Christians, our faith grows through receiving Word and Sacrament, and it is our Christian vocation to tell others about the salvation we have

Sunday Adult Bible Study: 1 Corinthians

In many ways, the Church of Corinth is much like the Western Christian Church today. Corinth was a major Greek seaport complete with traffic, travelers, sailors, and merchants. Corinth was cosmopolitan, pagan, idolatrous and immoral. At its height, Corinth was the fourth-largest city in the Roman Empire. Among its inhabitants were Roman colonists, ex-slaves, former soldiers, admirers of Greek wisdom and culture, and a scattering of Jews. It was a very prosperous and wealthy city, but it was also a very irreligious city.

Naturally, when the Christian faith collided with the paganism in Corinth, the young congregation founded by St. Paul, was plagued with many problems and questions. These problems included congregational factions, lawsuits, promiscuity, marriage and divorce, desertion, the place of women in the church, the Sacrament of the Altar, and the resurrection of the body. The Church in Corinth turned to St. Paul for guidance and counsel.

The Church in Corinth was not a perfect congregation, but through the Holy Spirit, St. Paul told this imperfect congregation about God's grace. The experiences of the Church in Corinth are increasingly those of present-day Christians, not only in traditional heathen countries, but also in so-called Christian lands slipping deeper into pagan ways. The impact of the fallen world's morality on the Church is all so evident today, with political factions growing, marriages failing, sexual morality sinking, and church disorders increasing. Today's Christian faces many of the moral dilemmas reflected in this epistle.

At the same time, 1 Corinthians is a letter of hope for our times. In trying to hold the Corinthians to the Word of God, St. Paul found it necessary to state both their human faults and their proper goals. In the epistle, St. Paul shows them the way of error and the way of truth. This epistle is practical as it presents everyday problems confronting Christians in the world as the Holy Spirit supplies the answers to our daily problems.

This study will begin upon the completion of our Ten Commandments study from *Luther's Large Catechism*. We will return to *Luther's Large Catechism* in the winter as we study the Creed. Upon completion of the 1 Corinthians study, we will study the vocation of a Christian voter in the fall.

More Than a Negative

Even if you've never had to testify in court, a thousand TV shows have made you familiar with the question, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?" Why not just make people swear to tell the truth? Or make them promise not to lie?

Any parent who has ever had to interrogate a child about a broken cookie jar or a scuffle over a toy knows the answer. There are plenty of ways to try to



get out of trouble without technically lying. You tell just enough of the truth to skate on by.

We often play the game of seeing *how close* we can get to sinning without *technically* going over the line.

But in our heart of hearts we know that this is not what God intended when He gave us the commandments. He's not giving us a merely negative rule and challenging us to just barely stay away from this or that. There is much more to each commandment than a prohibition. We shouldn't just avoid murdering people — we should be of service to our neighbor.

For each negative prohibition in the commandments there is a positive good that we are to cherish and protect. In the Eighth Commandment, that gift is the reputation of our neighbor and our relationship with him:

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Your relationship with your family members (who are your nearest neighbors), the other members of your congregation, your coworkers and your friends is one of the most precious gifts you have been given. You need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with your life, resources, time and income. This is an especially fragile gift because it's easy to ruin a relationship with slander and talking behind someone's back.

But speaking well of your neighbor in Christian love is absolutely free; it costs you nothing, yet it pays you great dividends. If you find this challenging at times, if you are tempted to speak ill of others, just remember that this other person is also a beloved child of God for whom your Lord Jesus suffered and died. Your Lord Jesus loves you both.

It's hard to believe it. The Lenten season has concluded with our Easter celebration of Christ's resurrection. Salvation is ours!

If you want to weigh in on name choice, ballots will be available through Debbie.

South Wisconsin District – LCMS representatives will be visiting on June 4, 2024 to further discuss the Lutheran school project. If you desire further information, please contact Pastor Adelsen or me.

Particular focus will be placed on reducing the number of items stored in the various closets at church and the storage building. How much fun will that be?
